


Travel Channel star and "Mysteries at the Museum" host Don Wildman with Cassie Ward on a recent visit to the Putnam History Museum.

COLLECTIONS

The museum acquired 16 historic documents and artifacts from 19 donors.

One of the most important acquisitions of the year included an 1825 letter written by West Point Foundry's Gouverneur Kemble to General J. Mason. This is one of the earliest correspondences we have found that link the nations early 19th century foundries. We thank Steven Walton, T. Arron Kotlensky, Preston Pittman, and Mark Forlow for this donation.

PUBLIC PROGRAMMING & EDUCATION
